Cash payments to survivors of WWII internment camps

Indian Claims Commission

Monetary compensation for territory lost as a result of broken federal treaties

Evanston, IL

Housing subsidies and cash payments to individuals and descendants harmed by de jure housing discrimination



- After George Floyd murder, community started exploring reparations in BUSD
- Members included local civic and religious leaders, BUSD families, former BUSD Board members, and BUSD staff (on personal time)
- Researched existing examples, discussed policy and legal considerations, raised money for and administered poll, and raised questions of funding and implementation

- Culminated in June 2022 request of BUSD to establish Reparations Task Force - returned to Board in Feb and Mar 2023 to reiterate request
- Board members expressed support for Task Force at first March meeting
- District announced Task Force later on March
 23
