SUBJECT: Approval of Expenditures for Copier Services

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Eleven years ago, in order to improve efficiency and reduce costs, all district copier services were placed under one contractual agreement. The contract provided for fifty-four copiers for the schools and administrative offices, as well as a Print Shop equipped with high volume and color copiers. This proved a successful arrangement, and the agreement has been approved (with minor changes) every five years since then.

The Board approved the most recent five-year contract February 27, 2013. This document is the annual reauthorization of expenditures for these services.

In an effort to lower costs associated with buying materials from outside sources, the Print Shop has increased volume. In the School Year (SY) 2013-14 the Print Shop was called upon to print the teaching and professional development materials for A Story of Units, since no textbooks were in print. The costs were lower than bids received for copying the materials elsewhere. The total expenditures for the Print Shop for copier and copying costs for SY 2013-14 was \$783,527. The new estimated costs SY 2014-15 is \$745,737.

The District will be utilizing these services primarily for legal services regarding personnel matters. The attorney rates are \$235 for Partners and \$225 per hour for Senior Associate and \$215 for Associates.

Burke, Williams and Sorreson, LLP to provide legal services as directed by the Superintendent and Deputy Superintendent. The District utilizes these services primarily for legal services regarding charter schools. The attorney rates are \$250 per hour for Shareholders and \$220 per hour for Associates.

Dora Dome Law Offices to provide legal services as directed by the Superintendent. The District utilizes these services primarily for legal services regarding student matters. The attorney rate is \$240 per hour.

RESOLUTION NO. 15-009 RESOLUTION THE "GANN" LIMIT

WHEREAS, in November of 1979, the California electorate did adopt Proposition 4, commonly called the Gann Amendment, which added Article XIII-B to the California Constitution; and,

WHEREAS, the provisions of that Article establish maximum appropriation limitations, commonly called "Gann Limits," for public agencies, including school districts; and,

WHEREAS, the District must establish a revised Gann limit for the 2013-2014 Fiscal Year and a projected Gann Limit for the 2014-2015 Fiscal Year in accordance with the provisions of Article XIII-B and applicable statutory law;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of the Berkeley Unified School District does provide public notice that the calculations and documentation of the Gann limits for the 2013-2014 and 2014-2015 Fiscal Years are made in accord with applicable constitutional and statutory law;

They would work 60% of their time for MfA in such activities as taking courses at the University of California at Berkeley to further develop their mathematics content knowledge, collaborating with other MfA Berkeley fellows on various mathematics and science teaching and learning topics, and serving as coaches/mentors. They would continue to serve 40% in their regular assignments as mathematics teachers in the District.

SUBJECT: Approve Measure H Financial Update (Unaudited Actuals FY 2014)

SUMMARY AND DISCUSSION

This report is an update of the Maintenance Yearly Plan and Measure H expenditures from July 1, 2013 through June 30, 2014. This report is not a comprehensive look at the activities in this fund; that more comprehensive look occurs when the Annual Plan is developed.

All income and expenses are consistent with previous reports and are based upon State defined object codes unless stated otherwise. This report differs slightly from the other District reports for two reasons. The first is that the hourly cost of the Director of Facilities is listed on this report as a salary and benefit expense, whereas Board reports will show this as an interfund (contract) expense. The second is that the cost to pay the City of Berkeley and Alameda County to collect and administer the taxes related to this Fund is shown as a contract expense in other Board reports, and it is shown here as an abatement to income. We did not have a chance to fully reconcile to the District books, but we believe there are no discrepancies.

EXPENDITURES

SALARIES AND BENEFITS

The projected expenditures for salaries, benefits and overtime is \$414,942 less than contained in the Annual Plan. Much of this difference was predicted at second interim due to staff vacancies and leaves. However, we also anticipated a salary increase for BCCE members and a partial implementation of the

classification study and neither of these expenses are recorded in FY 14. The salary and benefits budget includes costs for the following list of permanent staff positions. Please note that we list some jobs by functional area; we feel this provides the information in a more meaningful way.

We do not detail the 5% of head custodians charged to the Measure BB Fund in the chart above.

SUPPLIES

The expenses for supplies are \$68,495 more than projected in the Annual Plan. We did a few more projects on overtime and did a little less work with contractors than originally planned.

CONTRACTED SERVICES

The expenditures for routine contracted services are \$19,784 less than projected in the Annual Plan.

Maintenance initiative contract expenditures are \$48,922 more than projected in the Annual Plan. Most of that change was what worked occurred in June 2013 and June 2014 compared to our original projection.

EQUIPMENT

The expenditures for equipment are \$32,514 more than projected in the Annual Plan. One vehicle was ordered in FY 13 but was received in FY 14.

INDIRECT COSTS

The indirect/direct costs are \$9,707 less than planned. As all other line items decrease, the charge to the fund increases proportionally.

TOTAL EXPENDITURES

The changes detailed result in a \$294,502 decrease of projected expenses compared to the budget contained in the 2014 Annual Plan. The vast majority of the difference was predicted when the second interim was done and became the basis for the 2015 Measure H Plan.

TOTAL INCOME

The 2014 Annual Plan income projection for Measure H was \$5,730,000. The revised projection is \$5,737,537, an increase of \$7,537.

INCOME OVER EXPENDITURES

TOTAL INCOME

The income is \$5,737,537, an increase of \$7,537.

TOTAL EXPENDITURES

The expenditures are \$6,032,498, a decrease of \$294,502.

TOTAL INCOME OVER EXPENDITURE

The 2013 ending fund balance was \$1,031,195. The unaudited fund balance for Fiscal Year 2014 is \$736,234, a decrease of \$294,961. The predicted carryover from Fiscal Year 2014 to Fiscal Year 2015 is \$183,955 more than was listed in the 2015 Annual Plan. The difference is primarily due to later than anticipated salary increases and later than anticipated classification study implementation.

We can make attendance a top priority starting in the early grades, mobilize the community around reducing chronic absence and use data to identify students and schools in need of extra help.

Reducing chronic absence not only increases academic success for the students missing school, it means less wasted time in the classroom spent reviewing lessons for absentee students. Further, it offers a chance for schools and communities to make a measurable difference that shows up ahead of the academic progress.

PROCLAMATION NO. 15-013

Recognition of September 2014 as Attendance Awareness Month

WHEREAS good attendance is essential to student achievement and graduation, and we are committed to dedicating our resources and attention to reducing chronic absenteeism rates, with a focus starting as early as kindergarten; and

WHEREAS chronic absence – missing 10 percent or more of school for any reason including excused and unexcused absences, or just two of three days a month – is a proven predictor of academic trouble and dropout rates; and

WHEREAS improving attendance and reducing chronic absence takes commitment, collaboration and tailored approaches to particular challenges and strengths in each community; and

WHEREAS chronic absence predicts lower third-grade reading proficiency, course failure and eventual dropout, it weakens our communities and local economy; and

WHEREAS the impact of chronic absence hits low-income students and children of color particularly hard if they don't have the resources to make up for lost time in the classroom, and are more likely to face systemic barriers to getting to school – such as unreliable transportation, lack of access to health care, unstable or unaffordable housing; and

WHEREAS chronic absence exacerbates the achievement gap that separates low-income students from their peers, since students from low-income families are both more likely to be chronically absent and more likely to be affected academically by missing school. Absenteeism also undermines efforts to improve struggling schools, since it is hard to measure improvement in classroom instruction if students are not in class to benefit from them; and

WHEREAS schools and community partners can reach out more frequently to absent students to determine why they are missing school and what would help them attend more regularly; and

WHEREAS schools and districts must do more to track, calculate and share the data on how many students are chronically absent so that we can deliver the right interventions to the right students; and

WHEREAS all students – even those who show up regularly – are affected by chronic absence because teachers must spend time reviewing for students who missed lessons; and

WHEREAS chronic absence can be significantly reduced when schools, parents and communities work together to monitor and promote good attendance and address hurdles that keep children from getting to school; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that as the Board of Education of Berkeley Unified School District we proclaim that our schools will stand with the nation in recognizing September as "Attendance Awareness Month." We hereby commit to focusing on reducing chronic absenteeism to give all children an equitable opportunity to learn, grow and thrive academically, emotionally and socially. Specifically we will make clear that improved student attendance is one of our school district's top priorities among all of our teachers and school leaders.

Collins said he looked forward to another great year. He added that although the Classification Study was not perfect it "gets us a long way there". He said a lot of District employees would benefit from its implementation. With that in mind, Collins offered his support for a fair and reasonable

solution to negotiations with the Berkeley Council of Classified Employees (BCCE).

Committee Comments

LAURA Babbit Parent Advisory Committee

Babbit expressed dismay about BUSD data which showed declining test score results in reading and mathematics among African American and Latino students. She said everyone involved in the implementation of LCAP should be held accountable and that data analysis should be reviewed. Referring back to the disciplinary incident at Le Conte School, Babbit said poor leadership had been shown.

Board Members' Reports

Highlights:

- Vice President Appel said she was excited to be implementing LCAP and working with school sites and downtown leadership.
- Director Sinai expressed excitement about starting the new school year. She acknowledged Superintendent's Evan's hard work during school year 2013/14. She expressed enthusiasm about LCAP and urged the Board to use communication tools that led to its goals being clearly understood by the public. Sinai said she was saddened that the school year was starting with the somber backdrop of global conflict, the killing of Michael Brown in Missouri, and the tragic July 10, shooting death of Ayana Dominguez, an 18-year-old graduate of Berkeley Technical Academy. She said schools had to be places where all could flourish and receive moral grounding as part of public education.
- Director Hemphill said she was looking forward to the new school year and she urged BUSD to support parents so they in turn could better aid their students with the new Common Core Curriculum. She said it was important to track whether or not all students were successfully navigating the transition from the old to the new curriculum, and she challenged the Board to take on this task.
- Director Leyva-Cutler said the Humanitarian Crisis at the Border was personal to many families who are immigrants. She said in addition to passing Resolution No. 15-004, we needed to take action. She urged teachers to provide a forum for discussing difficult issues like the recent violence in Ferguson, Missouri. Director Leyva-Cutler reminded everyone that September was attendance awareness month.
- President Daniels said that starting September 13th, his office hours would be at 1pm, every second Saturday of the month at Take Five Café and Gallery, 3130 Sacramento Street, between 66th and 67th streets. Daniels said he had tried to discuss the implications of local gun violence from the beginning of his time as

president and that he would continue to do so. He said he had reached out to Ayana Dominguez's family to offer any support they needed and to express the District's condolences. Daniels said the Board had to find a way to publicize that this type of tragedy was happening in our community.

In August 2011, the District publicized a request for proposal (RFP) to potential organizations to operate and manage the afterschool program at Jefferson as well as be a fiscal agent of the JAZ afterschool fee-based program. Staff selected Bay Area Community Resources (BACR) based on their past performance and professional qualifications.

BACR has successfully fulfilled its contractual services for Jefferson's afterschool program over the past several years. BACR has been providing after school program services for over two decades. They currently operate programs at 32 schools in Oakland and Richmond, 6 schools in San Rafael, 12 schools in San Francisco and 3 schools in East Palo Alto. BACR is the fiscal sponsor for over 40 schools in San Francisco and West Contra Costa County.

Staff is requesting the Board to approve BACR as the afterschool provider for Jefferson Elementary School for Fiscal Year (FY) 2014-2015 with an option to extend to FY 2015-16 at the discretion of the Principal.

SUBJECT: Resolution in Support of AB420 – Limiting the Use of Willful

Defiance

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

AB 420 seeks to reduce the number of elementary school students who are suspended and expelled, particularly for relatively minor behavioral problems that do not threaten school safety. In high schools, the bill limits a superintendent or a principal's authority to suspend or expel a pupil from school for disrupting school activities or otherwise willfully defying authority.

- 1. This Bill specifically prohibits a pupil in grades K-5 from being suspended or expelled from school for willful defiance.
- 2. Specifies that a pupil in grades 6-12 may only be suspended from school for willful defiance after the third offense in a school year and provided that other means of correction as defined under current law were attempted before the recommendation to suspend.
- 3. Prohibits a pupil in grades 6-12 from being recommended for expulsion for willful defiance.

BERKELEY UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF AB 420 LIMITING THE USE OF WILLFUL DEFIANCE

WHEREAS, Berkeley Unified School District has committed to eliminating its current disproportionate number of African-American students suspended through participation in restorative justice, youth court, lifelines and other restorative practices, and has committed to providing alternatives to punitive discipline through behavioral intervention and expanding the set of peacemaking practices that build relational trust with students;

WHEREAS, California Education Code Section 48900 (k) allows students to be suspended and recommended for expulsion from a school district for "disrupting school activities or otherwise willfully defying the valid authority of school staff;"

WHEREAS, California Department of Education data reveals that Section 48900 (k) was the most serious grounds identified for approximately 43% of all suspensions in the state during 2012-13;

WHEREAS, nationally, black students are disproportionately discipline for "those offenses that require a judgment call by teachers, administrators and others...," such as "willful defiance;"

WHEREAS, suspensions and expulsions based on Section 48900(k) are so subjective and raise serious concerns about their disproportionate impact on students of color;

WHEREAS, Berkeley Unified School District has eliminated the practice of expelling a student based on Section 48900(k), and has committed to sharply reducing, and working towards eliminating, the practice of suspending a student based on Section 48900(k); and

WHEREAS, suspensions and expulsion can have a devastating impact on a student's educational future, and students subjected to exclusionary discipline policies are more likely to drop out of school and eventually end up in the juvenile justice system.

BE IT RESOLVED that Berkeley Unified School District strongly supports AB 420, a bill that would amend the Education Code to address the overuse of suspensions and expulsions for minor and subjectively imposed offenses under Education Code 48900(k).

Student Board Members

The Governing Board believes it is important to seek out and consider students' ideas, viewpoints and reactions to the educational program. In order to provide student input and involvement, the Board shall include two student Board members elected in accordance with procedures approved by the Board and described in E9150 of these bylaws.

The term of student Board members shall be one school year, commencing from July 1 to June 30. Student Board members shall have the right to attend all Board meetings except closed sessions.

Student Board members must be Berkeley residents.

Student Board members shall be seated with regular Board members and be recognized at meetings as full members. They may participate in questioning witnesses and discussing issues and shall receive all materials presented to Board members except those related to closed sessions.

Student Board members may be reimbursed for mileage but shall not receive compensation for attendance at Board meetings.

Student Board members may cast preferential votes on all matters except those subject to closed session discussion. Those are:

Existing litigation Personnel discipline, dismissal or appointment

Student expulsion Liability claims
Collective bargaining Property acquisition

Preferential votes shall be cast prior to the official Board vote and shall not affect the final numerical outcome of a vote. Preferential votes shall be recorded in the Board meeting minutes.

Student Board members may make motions (but not second motions) that may be acted upon by the Board, except on matters dealing with employer-employee relations pursuant to Government Code 3540-3549.3.

STUDENT BOARD MEMBER GUIDELINES

Duties of Student Board Members

The duties of the student Board members include the following:

- 1. To provide continuing input for Board deliberations.
- 2. To strengthen communications between the Board and district students.
- 3. To represent all students and facilitate the discussion of all sides of issues. This duty does not preclude the student Board members from stating his/her individual opinion

Selection and Term

The student Board member**s** shall be elected by the student body of Berkeley High School and Berkeley Technology Academy. Student Board members shall be Berkeley residents.

- 1. The student body of each high school shall have one vote.
- 2. The vote shall be cast by an elected student representative from each high school campus.
- 3. The student Board member shall be elected by a majority vote.
- 4. If the elected student director from Berkeley High School or Berkeley Technology Academy should transfer from his/her school site to the other district high school site during the second semester, he/she shall serve out his/her term as Student Director.

The term of office shall be from the first scheduled Board meeting in July to the last scheduled meeting in June.

Vacancy

If the position of a student Board member becomes vacant, another student Board member shall be elected as specified above within one month of the time that the seat becomes vacant.

Board Materials/Information

The Superintendent or designee's office shall provide the student Board member**s** with full and complete agendas and copies of any materials received by the Board except for those materials covered in closed session and any other

confidential materials. The Superintendent's office shall serve as the "home office" for the student Board member**s**, where he/she may make use of secretarial facilities and receive advice and/or information upon request.

The President of the Board or his or her designee will provide the student Board member**s** with an orientation as to the expectations, procedures and duties of their office.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

This report is an update on the Measure I Facilities Construction Plan approved by the Board on March 12, 2014. It includes all expenditures and income recorded in our system as of June 30, 2014. This report is not intended as a comprehensive look at long range financial planning; that review occurs annually.

There are two spreadsheets attached to this cover memo: one for Measure I and one for Measure AA and earlier. Please note that we did not include either the revenue or the expenditures of the Hillside sale, so this document is approximately \$1.6 million less than is shown in the District's financial record.

The remainder of this memo will define the modifications by budget on a school or program basis.

TOTAL EXPENDITURES MEASURE I

Jefferson School

The expenses at Jefferson were reduced by \$100,000 to release some contingencies for the expansion project.

King Middle School

The expenses at King were reduced by \$5,000. The track and field project contingencies were released.

Berkeley High School

The expenses at Berkeley High School were decreased by \$1,327,000. There was a release of contingencies for the Phase 2/Phase 3 project (\$1,580,000), a release of some contingencies for the science project (\$47,000) and an increase for the Donahue project approved by the Board on June 25th (\$300,000).

B-Tech High School

The expenses at B-Tech were reduced by \$40,000. There was a partial release of the science project (\$35,000) and we received a check from the City for engineering Derby street changes as a part of the Moellering field project (\$5,000).

Child Development

The expenses at Child Development were decreased by \$195,000 to release most of the contingencies for the pre-school expansion project.

TOTAL EXPENDITURES UNDER MEASURE I

The items listed above and minor rounding changes account for a \$1,667,125 decrease in total expenditures.

TOTAL INCOME

Minor income adjustments account for a \$333 decrease in income.

TOTAL INCOME OVER EXPENDITURE MEASURE I

The available balance has increased by \$1,666,792. The amount available at the end of the bond period (2020) is \$7,521,863.

MEASURE AA EXPENDITURES

Emerson School

The expenses at Emerson School were decreased by \$11,000 to release some contingencies on the site improvement project.

John Muir School

The expenses at John Muir School were decreased by \$16,000 to release some contingencies on the site improvement project.

Washington School

The expenses at Washington School were decreased by \$119,000 to release some contingencies for the portable project.

Whitter (BAM) School

The expenses at Whittier School were decreased by \$50,000 to release some contingencies for the portable project.

Rosa Parks School

The expenses at Rosa Parks were decreased by \$116,000 to release contingencies for the roofing project.

Longfellow Middle School

The expenses at Longfellow Middle School were decreased by \$3,000 to recognize a release of an old accounts payable for the annex project.

Willard Middle School

The expenses at Willard Middle School were increased by \$14,000 to increase the construction contingency for the site improvement project.

Berkeley High School

The expenses at Berkeley High School were decreased by \$57,000, primarily by releasing contingencies for the UV pool project.

Child Development

The planned expenses at Child Development were decreased by \$81,000 to release contingencies for the Hopkins pre-school project.

West Campus

The planned expenses at West Campus were decreased by \$380,000. This represents a release of contingencies for the Board Room project (\$220,000) and the Charter School project (\$160,000).

Inflation

The planned expenses for Inflation were decreased by \$40,000. The Board made this change when the portable project was awarded.

Furniture and Equipment

The planned expenses for furniture and equipment were increased by \$32,000. Additional audiovisual and tables were purchased for the Board Room to make the space be able to function better and to be able to be used as a conference room.

TOTAL EXPENDITURES UNDER MEASURE AA

The items listed above and minor rounding changes account for an \$827,188 decrease in total expenditures.

TOTAL INCOME UNDER MEASURE AA

The total income is \$467 less than planned.

TOTAL INCOME OVER EXPENDITURE MEASURE AA

The available balance has increased by \$826,721. The amount available is \$1,755,161.

BHS Construction Plan

The Board requested occasional reports on the completion of the South of Bancroft project at Berkeley High School. This is the sixth and final report on that project. The project includes the demolition of the Old Gym and the west bleachers, a new classroom and gym building, a small new facilities building, the demolition of a portion of the Donahue Gym and landscape improvements.

The project has a number of distinct phases or milestones. The contractor was required to install the scoreboard by August 1, 2012, demolish the Old Gym by August 2, 2012, delay starting the demolition of the west bleachers until after the 2012 football season and finish the new small bleachers by mid-June 2013, complete the new classroom and gymnasium by mid-December 2013, remove and store the portables (for BUSD re-use) and demolish the BOC at the Donahue Gym after the new classroom building is complete, and complete site work during the summers. The overall substantial completion was scheduled for late August 2014.

This report will address three areas: the schedule, the finances and an additional comment section.

Delays in a project can be caused by the owner (including hidden conditions), by the contractor, or can be excusable delays (such as excess rain or an earthquake). The scoreboard was installed on schedule. The demolition of the Old Gym was not completed on time because a large amount of asbestoscontaining material was found during the demolition. This delayed the demolition by approximately 7 weeks. The demolition delay pushed the project into the rainy season which also delayed the project. The contractor poured all of his footings before the bulk of the wet weather. The delay in the demolition also delayed the completion of the new gym and classroom building. The discovery of contaminated soil and the need to categorize that soil delayed the construction of the visitors' bleachers by approximately 5 weeks. Other phases were not delayed. The overall project actually finished approximately two weeks ahead of schedule.

At this point, all the work has been completed, with the punchlist being completed approximately when this Meeting occurs. The softball field will be closed until the grass is established. We anticipate recommending acceptance of this project at one of the next two Board Meetings.

The project has had one hundred thirty-seven approved change orders totaling \$1,896,360. The primary ones are the additional asbestos and hazardous soil removal and the addition of the laundry room in the new stadium. Together these account for almost 79% of the change orders authorized to date.

In general the job has been a success. The project superintendent, the inspector and the architect all worked together on the King seismic project which was very successful. The contractor has hired six entry level Berkeley apprentices during the project. The contractor has dipped just below the local hiring goals.

SUBJECT: Update on the Implementation of the Response to

Intervention and Instruction (RTI2) model in BUSD

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

At the conclusion of the 2011-2012 school year, BUSD's Response to Intervention and Instruction (RTI²) Advisory Committee finalized a manual for RTI². This document, in keeping with current research, articulates RTI² not as a specific program, but in fact as a *process*; a data-driven, multi-tiered approach to the early identification and support of all students, and particularly students with learning and behavioral challenges.

Subsequently, the creation last spring of the Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) further formalized BUSD's commitment to the development and district-wide implementation of the multi-tiered systems of support that make up an RTI² model. The LCAP allocated proportional funding for RTI² coaching and coordination beginning this school year at all K-5 school sites based on the number of students enrolled.

Staff will present an update to the board on the current state of RTI² development and implementation across BUSD. The update includes a general assessment of current services and processes at K-5 and secondary sites, as well as near term goals to further universalize key processes and services at each school; specifics include the make-up of RTI² team personnel, frequency of meetings, data to be analyzed, and indicators and information that prompt the identification of and focus on students who need concentrated and/or specific supports.
