Please answer the following prompts in essay format, visual art, poetry or spoken word.

What would the world be like if people had listened to Cesar Chavez and Dolores Huerta's advice to pay attention to the devastation of the environment (climate change)?

MIDDLE / HIGH SCHOOL

Core Value: Caring for the environment also means caring for people.

As Cesar Chavez Day approaches we begin to look at his incredible leadership. He was a man who brought voice to people who had not been heard before and gained publicity for equal rights for the farm workers. Throughout his leadership he had great allies, such as Dolores Huerta. Ms. Huerta continues the fight today and it was she who chanted the coined phrase: Si Se Puede! (Yes We Can!).

In your art, visual art, poetry or spoken word, please answer the following questions:

What would the world look and feel like today if politicians and decision makers listened to Dolores Huerta and Cesar Chavez's advice to pay attention to the devastation of the environment? Would life be different for farm workers if the government protected the environment? What is the connection between the heating up of the planet, pesticides (poisons) used to protect crops, farmworkers who harvest crops, the consumer and the farm owners. How does getting rid of pesticides used in farming help the farm workers, the farm owner, the consumer, and the planet?
