Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Berkeley Unified School District, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2016, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise Berkeley Unified School District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Berkeley Unified School District, as of June 30, 2016, and the respective changes in financial position and, where applicable, cash flows thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the *Management's Discussion and Analysis* on pages 4 to 15 and the General Fund Budgetary Comparison Schedule, the Schedule of Other Postemployment Benefits (OPEB) Funding Progress, the Schedule of the District's Proportionate Share of the Net Pension Liability, and the Schedule of the District's Contributions on pages 55 to 60 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise Berkeley Unified School District's basic financial statements. The accompanying schedule of expenditure of federal awards as required by Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* and the other supplementary information listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The schedule of expenditure of federal awards and other supplementary information as listed in the table of contents are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information, except for the Schedule of Financial Trends and Analysis, has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the schedule of expenditure of federal awards and other supplementary information as listed in the table of contents, except for the Schedule of Financial Trends and Analysis, are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

The Schedule of Financial Trends and Analysis has not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements, and accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on it.

Other Reporting Required by *Government Auditing Standards*

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated December 14, 2016 on our consideration of Berkeley Unified School District's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering Berkeley Unified School District's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

Management's Discussion & Analysis

The Management's Discussion and Analysis Section of the audit report is District management's view of the District's financial condition, and provides an opportunity to discuss important fiscal issues with the Board and the public. Accounting rules require this discussion and analysis, which makes reporting of finances similar to that of private business.

Financial Reports

Two government-wide financial reports are included in the financial statements, the Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities, which begin on page 16. These two statements report the District-wide financial condition and activities. The individual fund statements which focus on reporting the District's operations in more detail begin on page 18.

Overview of the Financial Statements

This annual report consists of three parts—Management's Discussion and Analysis (this section), the basic financial statements, and required supplementary information. The basic financial statements include two kinds of statements that present different views of the District:

- The first two statements are *District-wide financial statements* that provide both *short-term* and *long-term* information about the District's *overall* financial status.
- The remaining statements are *fund financial statements* that focus on *individual parts* of the District, reporting the District's operations in *more detail* than the District-wide statements.
- The *governmental funds* statements tell how *basic* services like regular and special education were financed in the *short term* as well as what remains for future spending.
- *Proprietary funds* statements offer *short-term* and *long-term* financial information about the activities the District operates *like businesses*, such as food services.
- *Fiduciary funds* statements provide information about the financial relationships in which the District acts solely as a *trustee or agent* for the benefit of others to whom the resources belong.

The financial statements also include *notes* that explain some of the information in the statements and provide more detailed data. The statements are followed by a section of *required supplementary information* that further explain and support the financial statements with a comparison of the District's budget for the year.

Figure A-2 summarizes the major features of the District's financial statements, including the portion of the District's activities they cover and the types of information they contain. This overview section is the Management's Discussion and Analysis and highlights the structure and contents of each of the statements.

District-wide Statements

The District-wide statements report information about the District's financial position as a whole, using accounting methods similar to those used by private-sector companies. The Statement of Net Position reports the difference between the District's assets and liabilities and can be used to measure the District's financial health or position.

Over time, increases or decreases in the District's net position is an indicator of whether its financial position is improving or deteriorating. To assess the overall health of the District, you need to consider additional nonfinancial factors such as changes in the District's property tax base and the condition of school buildings and other facilities.

The District ended the year with a Net Position of \$8,190,117, which is an increase of \$5,340,790 over prior year.

Capital Assets

At year-end, the District's capital assets had a net increase of \$13.4 million over the prior year. This represents a 4.4% increase over last year's total capital assets, and was primarily due to completion of construction projects in progress.

Land is accounted for at purchase value, not market value, and is not depreciated. Many of our school sites have low values for today's market because the District acquired the land many decades ago. We have determined the value of school buildings to be the depreciated cost of modernization unless the building is less than 25 years old. The increase in the value of Buildings and Improvement of Sites was primarily due to completion of several projects districtwide including modernization projects at Willard Middle, and John Muir and LeConte Elementary Schools, modernization of the gyms at King Middle and Berkeley High Schools, Districtwide Camera and Public Address Systems, roof and solar project at Cragmont Elementary School, and Land Improvement projects at Jefferson, Arts Magnet and Berkeley High School. Once these projects are completed, these costs are transferred to Improvement of Sites or Building assets.

District Indebtedness

At year-end, the District has \$400.2 million of long-term debt, which includes an additional \$114.8 million comprising of the District's portion of the net pension liability. Of total long term debt, \$263.7 million is for General Obligation Bonds secured by property tax increases voted on by local residents. General Obligation Bonds are a long term obligation issued in order to borrow up-front funds for bond measures until property tax proceeds are received from Berkeley residents.

Post-Employment Medical Benefits represent the annual unfunded portion that has not yet been reserved for future payments. The accumulated liability balance of \$9 million for post-employment medical benefits is based on an actuarial study. Compensated Absences represent the amount of liability the District owes for vacation that has been earned but not yet taken or paid out.

Fund 20 – Special Reserve Fund for Postemployment Benefits

In FY 2014-15, the District established Fund 20 for funds the District has set aside for the future cost of Post-Employment benefits, and transferred \$1.2 million to this fund. The ending fund balance as of June 30, 2016 is \$5.2 million. For financial reporting purposes, the District's Fund 20 is included within the District's General Fund.

Fund Financial Statements

The fund financial statements provide more detailed information about the District's most significant funds—not the District as a whole. Funds are accounting devices the District uses to keep track of specific sources of funding and spending on particular programs:

- Some funds are required by State law and by bond covenants.
- The District establishes other funds to control and manage money for particular purposes (such as repaying its long-term debts) or to show that it is properly using certain revenues (such as federal grants).

The District has three kinds of funds:

- *Governmental funds*— The District's General Operating, Special Revenue and Capital Projects Funds are included in the governmental funds. Special Revenue Funds include the Adult Education, Child Development, Cafeteria, Pupil Transportation Equipment and Special Reserve Funds. The Capital Projects Funds include the Building and County School Facilities Funds. The District also has the Bond Interest and Redemption Fund for purposes of debt service. Consequently, the governmental funds statements provide a detailed *short-term* view that helps you determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the District's programs. Because this information does not encompass the additional long-term focus of the District-wide statements, we provide additional information at the bottom of the governmental funds statements that explain the relationship (or differences) between them.
- *Proprietary funds*—Services the District funds by making a contribution based on a percentage of payroll expenditures are reported in proprietary funds. Proprietary funds are reported in the same way as the District-wide statements. The District's Self Insurance Fund used to account for the District's Workers' Compensation program transactions is a proprietary fund.
- *Fiduciary funds*—The District is the trustee, or *fiduciary*, for assets that belong to others, such as the Warrant Pass-Through fund and the student activities funds. The District is responsible for ensuring that the assets reported in these funds are used only for their intended purposes and by those to whom the assets belong. All of the District's fiduciary activities are reported in a separate Statement of Fiduciary Net Position and a statement of Changes in Fiduciary Net Position. We exclude these activities from the District-wide financial statements because the District cannot use these assets to finance its operations.

Financial Condition of the General Fund

The District's Unaudited Actuals demonstrate the District is fiscally solvent and has met the 3% reserve required by the State of California. The State of California requires all districts reserve 3% of their total expenditures (including transfers out) for economic uncertainties. The District's 3% state reserve requirement of \$4.2 million is partially maintained in the Special Reserve for Other Than Capital Outlay Projects Fund, which is included with the General Fund for financial reporting purposes. As of June 30, 2016, the District ended the year with \$3.2 million in excess of the 3% state reserve requirement in its Unrestricted General fund, after Commitments of \$3.2 million and Assignments of \$3.1 million.

The Districts Parcel Tax for Schools Excellence Program, BSEP, is approaching the end of the Measure in FY 2016-17. The Board approved a Commitment of \$2 million in FY 2015-16, for BSEP program support in FY 2016-17. The Board also approved \$1.2 million commitment for Common Core in FY 2016-17, for a total Commitment of \$3.2 million.

The Assignment of \$3.1 million was for a negotiated 3% bonus and other health cost negotiations in FY 2016-17, and for program support in FY 2016-17.

The State revenue incorporated in the District's financials is based on the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) and consists of Base and Supplemental funding, Supplemental funding is the allocation that increases or improves services as part of the District's Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) for English Learners, pupils eligible for free and reduced-price meals, and Foster Your pupils.

The surplus in FY 2015-16 is mainly as a result of additional funding received due to the increase in gap funding in State's new LCFF, and a net reduction in in other financing sources, since the Adult Education Program is funded directly by the State effective FY 2015-16 after accounting for the increase in contribution to Special Education.

Cost of General Fund Operations (Funds 01-08)

At year-end, the General Fund's total cost of operations was \$137.8 million. Total District expenditures were \$9.3 million more than the previous year due mainly to an increase in salaries and benefits as a result of a 4% salary increase and increase in STRS and PERS rates. There was a 13.7% increase in contract services and operating expenses due to increases in Restricted expenditures.

Revenues were only slightly more than budgeted. Salaries and benefits were slightly less than budgeted. However, total expenditures were \$3.3 million less than budgeted due partly to unexpended program funding that was assigned in ending fund balance, and significant savings in books and supplies, due to unspent balances in restricted programs and the parcel tax funds.

Cost of General Fund Operations (Fund 01 - Unrestricted)

At year-end, the District's cost of operations in the Unrestricted General Fund 01 was \$85.3 million. Total District expenditures were \$6.9 million more than the previous year primarily due to increase in salaries and benefits as a result of a salary increase in FY 2015-16, and an increase in STRS and PERS retirement rates. Total budgeted revenues were \$.2 million less than actual revenues received due to change in LCFF State budget assumptions. Total expenditures were \$1.4 million less than budgeted due to savings generated from budget reductions and unexpended funds. Unexpended funds were assigned in the fund balance.

ECONOMIC FACTORS AND NEXT YEAR’S BUDGET’S AND RATES

As of October 31, 2016, the District’s Unrestricted General Fund is deficit spending by \$3.7 million and has a projected ending fund balance in the amount of \$5.2 million after assigning and committing \$.7 million. The fund balance increased by \$.4 million since Adoption mainly due net savings in salaries, benefits and health costs due to vacant classified positions and adjustment based on actual costs. The deficit spending was planned and includes but is not limited to one-time expenditures of a 3% bonus to all employees in the amount of \$2,348,574 and support of BSEP in the last year of the Measure A (BSEP).

The new BSEP Measure E1 was passed by the voters by 88.86% and will replace Measure A effective fiscal year 2017-18 and will fund many of these one-time expenditures in the future. In addition, Proposition 55 was approved by state voters, and will extend high income tax rates for an additional 12 years, through 2030.

The budget assumptions used for projecting revenue are based on the enacted State Budget, which reflects the Governor’s view that positive economic trends are leveling off which is signaling a return to the more normal “COLA-only” environment. The enacted State budget includes a reduction in gap funding by 0.66%, which reduced our LCFF funding by \$32,289. The District’s targeted students, which include free and reduced price eligible students, English Language Learners and Foster Youth, decreased by 303 students since assumptions used at Budget Adoption. As a result, our unduplicated student percentage was reduced, and our funding for targeted students reduced by \$87,342 since budget Adoption.

The Governor’s budget appropriated \$200 million in one-time funds to increase college preparation and college-going rates for English learners, foster youth and low income students. Funds are allocated by approximately \$140 per ADA for unduplicated students in grades 9-12, with a minimum apportionment of \$75,000. At First Interim, the estimated amount that the District will receive is \$150,982. The District has recorded this amount as Restricted revenue, and has budgeted a placeholder for expenditures until a plan is approved.

As mention above under planned expenditures, in FY 2015-16, the District committed \$2 million for program support for BSEP in the last year of the measure. \$1.7 million was budgeted in FY 2016-17, so the remaining \$.3 million remains committed in FY 2016-17.

The Unrestricted General Fund budget includes one-time revenue of \$2.2 million for Mandated Cost Reimbursement. Without this one-time revenue, the district would be deficit spending by \$5.8 million. The District is using a portion of one-time revenues for Common Core and other one-time educational needs. The budget also includes one-time expenditures of \$7 million, which increased by \$.8 million since Adoption, mainly due to the board approved purchase of three new buses and assessment kits and legal and accounting costs. One-time expenditures and revenues are removed from expenditures in multi-year projections in the out years. It is important to note, that funds have not yet been reserved for Common Core implementation in fiscal years 2017-18 and 2018-19, which will be needed fully or partially as implementation continues.

The District is in the fourth year of the State’s new funding formula, LCFF that includes base and supplemental grants and the third year of supporting the District’s new Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP). LCAP establishes goals to increase and improve services for all students with the primary focus on improving the achievement of our lowest performing students. The new funding formula provides funding based on the District’s targeted students, which include students eligible for free and reduced price meals, English Language Learners and Foster Youth. The enacted budget projects that the LCFF will be 95.7% implemented in FY 2016-17. At full implementation, the supercharged increases are over and Districts will only get a cost-of living increase (COLA). The gap-closure percentages and COLA at May Revision are as follows.

While the annual gap-closure percentage estimates may seem large, it is important to note that the remaining gap to fill has shrunk significantly. This means that large gap-closure percentages may not represent large dollar increases.

Important note regarding BSEP/Class Size Reduction (CSR) Budget

The new BSEP Measure E1 was passed by the voters by 88.86% and will replace Measure A effective fiscal year 2017-18 and will fund many one-time expenditures in the future. The BSEP Class Size Reduction (CSR) fund is approaching the end of the Measure A in 2016-17. As mentioned earlier, the Unrestricted General Fund had included an additional \$1.7 million in salaries and benefits to continue CSR program support in 2016-17 due to the insufficiency of BSEP funding in the last year of the BSEP measure.

In FY 2015-16, the General Fund funded \$348,000 of literacy coaches using base grant funding. Additionally, in FY 2015-16, the budgeted transfer from the BSEP fund to the General Fund for CSR was not increased by \$524,600 for BSEP's share of the negotiated salary increase.

With the passage of Measure E1, the budget assumptions used in the multi-year projections for 2017-18 assume that the BSEP Measure will receive the funding projected in the financial models prepared to support the new measure, and that the additional revenue will be expended on programs with the recommendation of the Planning and Oversight Committee in accordance with the new measure language. The financial models used for budget assumptions will be updated as more up to date assumptions become available such as COLA's, negotiated salary increases, and staff recommendation for BSEP programs.

Multi-Year Projections


Based on the District's Multi-year Projections, the District is projected to have an undesignated fund balance of \$5.9 million and designated fund balance of \$.3 million for a total of \$6.3 million for FY 2017-18. The District is projecting a balanced budget in FY 2017-18, which does not include one-time revenues or expenditures (i.e. Common Core) or future negotiated salary increases, if any. It also does not include a possible new school, final ongoing cost adjustments for the classification study implementation, and assumes that the full share of the BSEP/CSR transfer to the General Fund will be made and BSEP will fund expanded course offerings and program support at the previous level. For FY 2018-19, the District is projected to have an undesignated fund balance of \$4.8 million and designated fund balance of \$.4 million for a total of \$5.2 million. The District is projecting a deficit of \$1.1 million, and does not include one-time revenues or expenditures.

Reserves/Reserve Cap

County Offices of Education reinforce the need for reserves over the minimum reserve requirements. Districts should maintain minimum reserve levels sufficient to protect educational programs from severe disruption in an economic downturn. The typical 3% to 5% reserve is insufficient to cover operating expenses. Many Districts have established policies calling for higher than minimum reserves, recognizing their duty to maintain fiscal solvency. The guidance from previous Common Messages stands. The adequacy of a given reserve level should be assessed based on the LEA's own specific circumstances, and numerous reasonable models are available for consideration. Staff will be recommending that the Board adopt a policy to increase the District's reserve requirement now the books are closed.

While the economy has improved quickly over the last years, both the Governor and the Department of Finance continue to remind educational entities that a recession is probable and would negatively affect school funding.

The Chart below shows the composition of the General Fund’s ending fund balance for the past three years, the current year and the two subsequent years.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Berkeley Unified School District (the "District") accounts for its financial transactions in accordance with the policies and procedures of the California Department of Education's *California School Accounting Manual*. The accounting policies of the District conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. The following is a summary of the more significant policies:

Reporting Entity: The Board of Trustees is the level of government which has governance responsibilities over all activities related to public elementary school education in Berkeley Unified School District. The Board is not included in any other governmental "reporting entity" as defined by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board since Board members have decision-making authority, the power to designate management, the responsibility to significantly influence operations and primary accountability for fiscal matters.

Basis of Presentation - Financial Statements: The financial statements include a Management Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) section providing an analysis of the District's overall financial position and results of operations, financial statements prepared using full accrual accounting for all of the District's activities, including infrastructure, and a focus on the major funds.

Basis of Presentation - Government-Wide Financial Statements: The Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities displays information about the reporting government as a whole. Fiduciary funds are not included in the government-wide financial statements. Fiduciary funds are reported only in the Statement of Fiduciary Assets and Liabilities at the fund financial statement level.

The Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities are prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues, expenses, gains, losses, assets and liabilities resulting from exchange and exchange-like transactions are recognized when the exchange takes place. Revenues, expenses, gains, losses, assets and liabilities resulting from nonexchange transactions are recognized in accordance with the requirements of Governmental Accounting Standards Board Codification Section (GASB Cod. Sec.) N50.118-.121.

Program revenues: Program revenues included in the Statement of Activities derive directly from the program itself or from parties outside the District's taxpayers or citizenry, as a whole; program revenues reduce the cost of the function to be financed from the District's general revenues.

Allocation of indirect expenses: The District reports all direct expenses by function in the Statement of Activities. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a function. Depreciation expense is specifically identified by function and is included in the direct expense of each function. Interest on general long-term liabilities is considered an indirect expense and is reported separately on the Statement of Activities.

Basis of Presentation - Fund Accounting: The accounts of the District are organized on the basis of funds, each of which is considered to be a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund balances, revenues, and expenditures. District resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purpose for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

A - Major Funds

General Fund:

The General Fund is the general operating fund of the District and accounts for all revenues and expenditures of the District not encompassed within other funds. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to some other fund are accounted for in this fund. General operating expenditures and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds are paid from the General Fund. The activity of the Special Reserve for Other than Capital Outlay Projects Fund and the Special Reserve for Postemployment Benefits Fund are included with the General Fund for financial reporting purposes.

Building Fund:

The Building Fund is a capital projects fund used to account for resources used for the acquisition of capital facilities by the District.

Bond Interest and Redemption Fund:

The Bond Interest and Redemption Fund is a debt service fund used to account for the accumulation of resources for, and the payment of, general long-term debt principal, interest, and related costs.

B - Other Funds

Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources that are legally restricted to expenditures for specific purposes. This includes the Adult Education, Child Development, Cafeteria and Pupil Transportation Equipment Funds.

The County School Facilities Fund is a capital projects fund used to account for resources used for new school facilities construction, modernization projects, facility hardship grants, and for acquisition of capital facilities of the District.

The Tax Override Fund is a debt service fund used to account for the accumulation of resources for, and the payment of, general long-term debt principal, interest, and related costs.

The Self-Insurance Fund is an internal service fund which is used to account for the District's workers compensation claims.

Agency Funds are Fiduciary Funds which are used to account for assets of others, for which the District has an agency relationship with the activity of the fund. This classification consists of the Warrant/Pass-Through and the Student Body Funds.

Basis of Accounting: Basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures or expenses are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. Basis of accounting relates to the timing of the measurement made, regardless of the measurement focus applied.

Accrual: Governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements, and the proprietary and fiduciary fund financial statements are presented on the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when incurred.

Modified Accrual: The governmental funds financial statements are presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when susceptible to accrual; i.e., both measurable and available. "Available" means collectible within the current period or within 60 days after year end. Expenditures are generally recognized under the modified accrual basis of accounting when the related liability is incurred. The exception to this general rule is that principal and interest on general obligation long-term liabilities, if any, is recognized when due.

Budgets and Budgetary Accounting: By state law, the Board of Trustees must adopt a final budget by July 1. A public hearing is conducted to receive comments prior to adoption. The Board of Trustees complied with these requirements.

Receivables: Receivables are made up principally of amounts due from the State of California. The District has determined that no allowance for doubtful accounts was needed as of June 30, 2016.

Stores Inventory: Stores inventory is recorded using the consumption method, in that inventory acquisitions are initially recorded in the inventory asset account, and then charged to expenditure when used. Inventory reserves are equally offset by a fund balance reserve, which indicates that these amounts are not "available for appropriation and expenditure" even though they are a component of net position.

Capital Assets: Capital assets purchased or acquired, with an original cost of \$5,000 or more, are recorded at historical cost or estimated historical cost. Contributed assets are reported at acquisition value for the contributed asset. Additions, improvements and other capital outlay that significantly extend the useful life of an asset are capitalized. Other costs incurred for repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred. Capital assets are depreciated using the straight-line method over 5 - 50 years depending on asset types.

Deferred Outflows/Inflows of Resources: In addition to assets, the statement of net position includes a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred outflows of resources, represents a consumption of net position that applies to a future period(s), and as such will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense/expenditures) until then. The District has recognized a deferred loss on refunding, which results from the difference in the carrying value of refunded debt and its reacquisition price. This amount is deferred and amortized over the shortened life of the refunded or refunding debt. Amortization for the year ended June 30, 2016 associated with the deferred loss on refunding totaled \$255,650. Additionally, the District has recognized a deferred outflow of resources related to the recognition of the pension liability reported in the statement of net position. Amortization for the year ended June 30, 2016 totaled \$606,000.

In addition to liabilities, the statement of net position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred inflows of resources, represents an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period(s) and as such, will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time. The District has recognized a deferred inflow of resources related to the recognition of the net pension liability. Amortization for the year ended June 30, 2016 totaled \$4,835,050.

Pensions: For purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, and pension expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the State Teachers' Retirement Plan (STRP) and Public Employers Retirement Fund B (PERF B) and additions to/deductions from STRP's and PERF B's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by STRP and PERF B. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

Interfund Activity: Interfund activity is reported as either loans, services provided, reimbursements or transfers. Loans are reported as interfund receivables and payables as appropriate and are subject to elimination upon consolidation. Services provided, deemed to be at market or near market rates, are treated as revenues and expenditures/expenses. Reimbursements are when one fund incurs a cost, charges the appropriate benefiting fund and reduces its related cost as a reimbursement. All other interfund transactions are treated as transfers. Transfers between governmental or proprietary funds are netted as part of the reconciliation to the government-wide financial statements.

Compensated Absences: Compensated absences in the amount of \$1,243,552 is recorded as a liability of the District. The liability is for earned but unused benefits.

Accumulated Sick Leave: Sick leave benefits are not recorded as liabilities on the books of the District. The District's policy is to record amounts as operating expenditures in the period sick leave is taken since such benefits do not vest nor is payment probable; however, unused sick leave is added to the creditable service period for calculation of retirement benefits for all STRP and PERF B employees, when the employee retires.

Unearned Revenue: Revenues from federal, state, and local special projects and programs are recognized when qualified expenditures have been incurred. Funds received but not earned are recorded as unearned revenue until earned.

Encumbrances: Encumbrance accounting is used in all budgeted funds to reserve portions of applicable appropriations for which commitments have been made. Encumbrances are recorded for purchase orders, contracts, and other commitments when they are written. Encumbrances are liquidated when the commitments are paid. All encumbrances are liquidated at June 30.

Net Position: Net position is displayed in three components:

- 1 - Net Investment in Capital Assets - Consists of capital assets including restricted capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances (excluding unspent bond proceeds) of any bonds, mortgages, notes or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets.

2 - Restricted Net Position - Restrictions of the ending net position indicate the portions of net position not appropriate for expenditure or amounts legally segregated for a specific future use. The restriction for legally restricted programs revenues represents the portion of net position restricted to specific program expenditures. The restrictions for capital projects and debt service represents the portion of net position restricted for capital projects and the retirement of debt. The restriction for self-insurance represents the portion of net position which will be used for payment of workers compensation claims. It is the District's policy to first use restricted net position when allowable expenditures are incurred.

3 - Unrestricted Net Position - All other net position that do not meet the definitions of "restricted" or "net investment in capital assets".

Fund Balance Classifications: Governmental Accounting Standards Board Codification Sections 1300 and 1800, *Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions* (GASB Cod. Sec. 1300 and 1800) implements a five-tier fund balance classification hierarchy that depicts the extent to which a government is bound by spending constraints imposed on the use of its resources. The five classifications, discussed in more detail below, are nonspendable, restricted, committed, assigned and unassigned.

A - Nonspendable Fund Balance:

The nonspendable fund balance classification reflects amounts that are not in spendable form, such as revolving fund cash and stores inventory.

B - Restricted Fund Balance:

The restricted fund balance classification reflects amounts subject to externally imposed and legally enforceable constraints. Such constraints may be imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments, or may be imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation. These are the same restrictions used to determine restricted net position as reported in the government-wide and fiduciary fund statements.

C - Committed Fund Balance:

The committed fund balance classification reflects amounts subject to internal constraints self-imposed by formal action of the Board of Trustees. The constraints giving rise to committed fund balance must be imposed no later than the end of the reporting period. The actual amounts may be determined subsequent to that date but prior to the issuance of the financial statements. Formal action by the Board of Trustees is required to remove any commitment from any fund balance. At June 30, 2016, the District had no committed fund balances.

D - Assigned Fund Balance:

The assigned fund balance classification reflects amounts that the District's Board of Trustees has approved to be used for specific purposes, based on the District's intent related to those specific purposes. The Board of Trustees can designate personnel with the authority to assign fund balances, however, as of June 30, 2016, no such designation has occurred.

E - Unassigned Fund Balance:

In the General Fund only, the unassigned fund balance classification reflects the residual balance that has not been assigned to other funds and that is not restricted, committed, or assigned to specific purposes.

In any fund other than the General Fund, a positive unassigned fund balance is never reported because amounts in any other fund are assumed to have been assigned, at least, to the purpose of that fund. However, deficits in any fund, including the General Fund that cannot be eliminated by reducing or eliminating amounts assigned to other purposes are reported as negative unassigned fund balance.

Fund Balance Policy: The District has an expenditure policy relating to fund balances. For purposes of fund balance classifications, expenditures are to be spent from restricted fund balances first, followed in order by committed fund balances (if any), assigned fund balances and lastly unassigned fund balances.

While GASB Cod. Sec. 1300 and 1800 do not require districts to establish a minimum fund balance policy or a stabilization arrangement, GASB Cod. Sec. 1300 and 1800 do require the disclosure of a minimum fund balance policy and stabilization arrangements, if they have been adopted by the Board of Trustees. At June 30, 2016, the District has not established a minimum fund balance policy nor has it established a stabilization arrangement.

Property Taxes: Secured property taxes are attached as an enforceable lien on property as of March 1. Taxes are due in two installments on or before December 10 and April 10. Unsecured property taxes are due in one installment on or before August 31. The County of Alameda bills and collects taxes for the District. Tax revenues are recognized by the District when received.

Eliminations and Reclassifications: In the process of aggregating data for the Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities, some amounts reported as interfund activity and balances in the funds were eliminated or reclassified. Interfund receivables and payables were eliminated to minimize the "grossing up" effect on assets and liabilities within the governmental activities column.

Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions. These estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

Pooled Funds: In accordance with Education Code Section 41001, the District maintains substantially all of its cash in the interest bearing Alameda County Treasurer's Pooled Investment Fund. The District is considered to be an involuntary participant in an external investment pool. The fair value of the District's investment in the pool is reported in the financial statements at amounts based upon the District's pro-rata share of the fair value provided by the County Treasurer for the entire portfolio (in relation to the amortized cost of that portfolio). The balance available for withdrawal is based on the accounting records maintained by the County Treasurer, which is recorded on the amortized cost basis.

Deposits - Custodial Credit Risk: The District limits custodial credit risk by ensuring uninsured balances are collateralized by the respective financial institution. Cash balances held in banks are insured up to \$250,000 by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) and are collateralized by the respective financial institution. At June 30, 2016, the carrying amount of the District's accounts was \$967,057 and the bank balance was \$900,897. \$555,115 of the bank balance was FDIC insured and \$345,782 remained uninsured but fully collateralized.

Cash with Fiscal Agent: Cash with Fiscal Agent in the Self-Insurance Fund represents a security deposit held by a third party.

Interest Rate Risk: The District does not have a formal investment policy that limits cash and investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates. At June 30, 2016, the District had no significant interest rate risk related to cash and investments held.

Credit Risk: The District does not have a formal investment policy that limits its investment choices other than the limitations of state law.

Concentration of Credit Risk: The District does not place limits on the amount it may invest in any one issuer. At June 30, 2016, the District had no concentration of credit risk.

NOTE 3 - INTERFUND TRANSACTIONS

Interfund Activity: Transactions between funds of the District for goods and services are recorded as interfund transfers. The unpaid balances at year end, as a result of such transactions, are shown as due to and from other funds.

NOTE 5 - LONG-TERM LIABILITIES

General Obligation Bonds: In June 2007, the District issued General Obligation Bonds, Election of 2000, Series 2007 totaling \$24,500,000, for the purpose of financing projects to repair, upgrade and add new classrooms. The Series 2007 General Obligation Bonds bear interest at rates ranging from 4.75% to 5.00% and are scheduled to mature through August 1, 2031. In May 2016, certain maturities of the Series 2007 Bonds were refunded through the issuance of 2016 General Obligation Refunding Bonds.

In May 2009, the District issued 2009 General Obligation Bonds totaling \$17,774,222, for the purpose of financing renovations and modernization projects of school facilities. The 2009 General Obligation Bonds bear interest at rates ranging from 3.375% to 5.00% and are scheduled to mature through August 1, 2033.

In November 2009, the District issued 2009 General Obligation Refunding Bonds, totaling \$25,440,000, for the purpose of refunding the District's 1998 General Obligation Refunding Bonds. The 2009 General Obligation Refunding Bonds bear interest at rates ranging from 2.00% to 5.00% and are scheduled to mature through August 1, 2020.

In May 2011, the District issued General Obligation Bonds, Election of 2010, Series A and General Obligation Bonds, Election of 2010, Series B totaling \$25,000,000 and \$10,000,000, respectively, for the purpose of financing renovations and modernization projects of school facilities. The 2010 Series A General Obligation Bonds bear interest at rates ranging from 3.50% to 5.00% and are scheduled to mature through May 1, 2026. The 2010 Series B General Obligation Bonds bear interest at rates ranging from 5.00% to 5.375% and are scheduled to mature through August 1, 2035.

In September 2011, the District issued 2011 General Obligation Refunding Bonds, totaling \$55,625,000, for the purpose of refunding the District's General Obligation Bonds, Election of 2000, Series 2003 and the District's 2004 General Obligation Refunding Bonds. The 2011 General Obligation Refunding Bonds bear interest at rates ranging from 2.00% to 5.00% and are scheduled to mature through August 1, 2027.

In February 2013, the District issued 2013 General Obligation Refunding Bonds, Series A, totaling \$19,590,000. The proceeds of the Bonds were used to refund a portion of the outstanding balance of the Election of 2000, Series 2005 General Obligation Bonds. The 2013 General Obligation Refunding Bonds, Series A bear interest at rates ranging from 2.00% to 4.00% and are scheduled to mature through August 1, 2029. As of June 30, 2016, the refunded Election of 2000, Series 2005 General Obligation Bonds have been fully repaid.

In May 2013, the District issued General Obligation Bonds, Election of 2010, Series C totaling \$40,000,000 for the purpose of financing renovations and modernization projects of school facilities. The 2010 Series C General Obligation Bonds bear interest at rates ranging from 3.00% to 4.125% and are scheduled to mature through August 1, 2052.

In June 2013, the District issued 2013 General Obligation Refunding Bonds, Series B, totaling \$13,000,000. The proceeds of the Bonds were used to refund a portion of the outstanding balance of the 2005 General Obligation Refunding Bonds. The 2013 General Obligation Refunding Bonds, Series B bear interest at rates ranging from 3.00% to 5.00% and are scheduled to mature through August 1, 2024.

In June 2015, the District issued General Obligation Bonds, Election of 2010, Series D totaling \$50,000,000, for the purpose of financing the acquisition and construction of educational facilities. The Series 2015 General Obligation Bonds bear interest at rates ranging from 3.375% to 5.00% and are scheduled to mature through August 1, 2045.

In July 2015, the District issued 2015 General Obligation Refunding Bonds totaling \$23,665,000. The proceeds were used to refund, on a current basis, all of the outstanding maturities of the 2008 General Obligation Refunding Bonds. The refunded bonds have been fully repaid at June 30, 2016. The 2015 General Obligation Refunding Bonds bear interest at rates ranging from 2.00% to 5.00% and are scheduled to mature through August 1, 2024.

Although the 2015 Refunding Bonds resulted in the recognition of an accounting loss of \$180,549, for the year ended June 30, 2016, the District in effect reduced its aggregate debt service payments by \$2.7 million over the next 8 years and obtained an economic gain of \$2.3 million.

In May 2016, the District issued 2016 General Obligation Refunding Bonds totaling \$17,905,000. The proceeds were used to refund, on a current basis, a portion of the outstanding balance of the Election of 2000, Series 2007 Bonds. At June 30, 2016, \$18,575,000 of the refunded Series 2007 Bonds were still outstanding and scheduled to be repaid on August 1, 2016. The 2016 General Obligation Refunding Bonds bear interest at rates ranging from 2.00% to 5.00% and are scheduled to mature through August 1, 2031.

Although the 2016 Refunding Bonds resulted in the recognition of an accounting loss of \$256,613, for the year ended June 30, 2016, the District in effect reduced its aggregate debt service payments by \$4.4 million over the next 15 years and obtained an economic gain of \$3.8 million.

General Information about the State Teachers' Retirement Plan

Plan Description: Teaching-certified employees of the District are provided with pensions through the State Teachers' Retirement Plan (STRP) – a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the California State Teachers' Retirement System (CalSTRS). The Teachers' Retirement Law (California Education Code Section 22000 et seq.), as enacted and amended by the California Legislature, established this plan and CalSTRS as the administrator. The benefit terms of the plans may be amended through legislation. CalSTRS issues a publicly available financial report that can be obtained at <http://www.calstrs.com/comprehensive-annual-financial-report>.

Benefits Provided: The STRP Defined Benefit Program has two benefit formulas:

- CalSTRS 2% at 60: Members first hired on or before December 31, 2012, to perform service that could be creditable to CalSTRS.
- CalSTRS 2% at 62: Members first hired on or after January 1, 2013, to perform service that could be creditable to CalSTRS.

The Defined Benefit Program provides retirement benefits based on members' final compensation, age and years of service credit. In addition, the retirement program provides benefits to members upon disability and to survivors/beneficiaries upon the death of eligible members. There are several differences between the two benefit formulas which are noted below.

CalSTRS 2% at 60

CalSTRS 2% at 60 members are eligible for normal retirement at age 60, with a minimum of five years of credited service. The normal retirement benefit is equal to 2.0 percent of final compensation for each year of credited service. Early retirement options are available at age 55 with five years of credited service or as early as age 50 with 30 years of credited service. The age factor for retirements after age 60 increases with each quarter year of age to 2.4 percent at age 63 or older. Members who have 30 years or more of credited service receive an additional increase of up to 0.2 percent to the age factor, known as the career factor. The maximum benefit with the career factor is 2.4 percent of final compensation.

CalSTRS calculates retirement benefits based on a one-year final compensation for members who retired on or after January 1, 2001, with 25 or more years of credited service, or for classroom teachers with less than 25 years of credited service if the employer elected to pay the additional benefit cost prior to January 1, 2014. One-year final compensation means a member's highest average annual compensation earnable for 12 consecutive months calculated by taking the creditable compensation that a member could earn in a school year while employed on a fulltime basis, for a position in which the person worked. For members with less than 25 years of credited service, final compensation is the highest average annual compensation earnable for any three consecutive years of credited service.

CalSTRS 2% at 62

CalSTRS 2% at 62 members are eligible for normal retirement at age 62, with a minimum of five years of credited service. The normal retirement benefit is equal to 2.0 percent of final compensation for each year of credited service. An early retirement option is available at age 55. The age factor for retirement after age 62 increases with each quarter year of age to 2.4 percent at age 65 or older.

All CalSTRS 2% at 62 members have their final compensation based on their highest average annual compensation earnable for three consecutive years of credited service.

Contributions: Required member, employer and state contribution rates are set by the California Legislature and Governor and detailed in Teachers' Retirement Law. Contribution rates are expressed as a level percentage of payroll using the entry age normal actuarial cost method.

A summary of statutory contribution rates and other sources of contributions to the Defined Benefit Program are as follows:

Members - Under CalSTRS 2% at 60, the member contribution rate was 9.20 percent of applicable member earnings for fiscal year 2015-16. Under CalSTRS 2% at 62, members contribute 50 percent of the normal cost of their retirement plan, which resulted in a contribution rate of 8.56 percent of applicable member earnings for fiscal year 2015-16.

In general, member contributions cannot increase unless members are provided with some type of "comparable advantage" in exchange for such increases. Under previous law, the Legislature could reduce or eliminate the 2 percent annual increase to retirement benefits. As a result of AB 1469, effective July 1, 2014, the Legislature cannot reduce the 2 percent annual benefit adjustment for members who retire on or after January 1, 2014, and in exchange for this "comparable advantage," the member contribution rates have been increased by an amount that covers a portion of the cost of the 2 percent annual benefit adjustment.

Effective July 1, 2014, with the passage of AB 1469, member contributions for those under the 2% at 60 benefit structure increase from 8.0 percent to a total of 10.25 percent of applicable member earnings, phased in over the next three years. For members under the 2% at 62 benefit structure, contributions will increase from 8.0 percent to 9.205 percent of applicable member earnings, again phased in over three years, if there is no change to normal cost.

Employers – 10.73 percent of applicable member earnings.

In accordance with AB 1469, employer contributions will increase from 8.25 percent to a total of 19.1 percent of applicable member earnings phased in over seven years starting in 2014. The new legislation also gives the board limited authority to adjust employer contribution rates from July 1, 2021 through June 2046 in order to eliminate the remaining unfunded actuarial obligation related to service credited to members prior to July 1, 2014. The board cannot adjust the rate by more than 1 percent in a fiscal year, and the total contribution rate in addition to the 8.25 percent cannot exceed 12 percent.

The District contributed \$6,307,138 to the plan for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2016.

State - 7.391 percent of the members’ creditable earnings from the fiscal year ending in the prior calendar year.

Additionally, beginning October 1, 1998, a statutory contribution rate of 0.524 percent, adjustable annually in 0.25 percent increments up to a maximum of 1.505 percent, of the creditable earnings from the fiscal year ending in the prior calendar year per Education Code Section 22955(b). This contribution is reduced to zero if there is no unfunded actuarial obligation and no normal cost deficit for benefits in place as of July 1, 1990. Based on the actuarial valuation, as of June 30, 2012 there was no normal cost deficit, but there was an unfunded obligation for benefits in place as of July 1, 1990. As a result, the state was required to make quarterly payments starting October 1, 2013, at an additional contribution rate of 1.024 percent. As of June 30, 2014, the state contributed \$200.7 million of the \$267.6 million total amount for fiscal year 2013-14. As a result of AB 1469, the fourth quarterly payment of \$66.9 million was included in an increased first quarter payment of \$94 million for the 2014-15 fiscal year, which was transferred on July 1, 2014.

In accordance with AB 1469, the portion of the state appropriation under Education Code Section 22955(b) that is in addition to the 2.017 percent has been replaced by section 22955.1(b) in order to fully fund the benefits in effect as of 1990 by 2046. The additional state contribution will increase from 1.437 percent in 2014-15 to 4.311 percent in 2016-17. The increased contributions end as of fiscal year 2046-2047.

* The new legislation also gives the board limited authority to adjust state contribution rates from July 1, 2017, through June 2046 in order to eliminate the remaining unfunded actuarial obligation associated with the 1990 benefit structure. The board cannot increase the rate by more than 0.50 percent in a fiscal year, and if there is no unfunded actuarial obligation, the contribution rate imposed to pay for the 1990 benefit structure shall be reduced to 0 percent. The net pension liability was measured as of June 30, 2015, and the total pension liability used to calculate the net pension liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of June 30, 2014. CalSTRS uses custom mortality tables to best fit the patterns of mortality among its members. These custom tables are based on RP2000 series tables adjusted to fit CalSTRS experience. RP2000 series tables are an industry standard set of mortality rates published by the Society of Actuaries. See CalSTRS July 1, 2006 – June 30, 2010 experience analysis for more information.

The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was determined using a building-block method in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class. The best estimate ranges were developed using capital market assumptions from CalSTRS general investment consultant as an input to the process. Based on the model from CalSTRS consulting actuary’s investment practice, a best estimate range was determined by assuming the portfolio is re-balanced annually and that annual returns are log normally distributed and independent from year to year to develop expected percentiles for the long-term distribution of annualized returns. The assumed asset allocation by PCA is based on board policy for target asset allocation in effect on February 2, 2012, the date the current experience study was approved by the board. Best estimates of 10-year geometric real rates of return and the assumed asset allocation for each major asset class used as input to develop the actuarial investment rate of return are summarized in the following table:

Discount Rate: The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 7.60 percent. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that contributions from plan members and employers will be made at statutory contribution rates in accordance with the rate increase per Assembly Bill 1469. Projected inflows from investment earnings were calculated using the long-term assumed investment rate of return (7.60 percent) and assuming that contributions, benefit payments, and administrative expense occur midyear. Based on those assumptions, the STRP’s fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments to current plan members. Therefore, the long-term assumed investment rate of return was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability.

NOTE 8 – NET PENSION LIABILITY – PUBLIC EMPLOYER’S RETIREMENT FUND B

General Information about the Public Employer’s Retirement Fund B

Plan Description: The schools cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan Public Employer’s Retirement Fund B (PERF B) is administered by the California Public Employees’ Retirement System (CalPERS). Plan membership consists of non-teaching and non-certified employees of public schools (K-12), community college districts, offices of education, charter and private schools (elective) in the State of California.

The Plan was established to provide retirement, death and disability benefits to non-teaching and noncertified employees in schools. The benefit provisions for Plan employees are established by statute. CalPERS issues a publicly available financial report that can be obtained at <https://www.calpers.ca.gov/docs/forms-publications/cafr-2015.pdf>.

Benefits Provided: The benefits for the defined benefit plans are based on members’ years of service, age, final compensation, and benefit formula. Benefits are provided for disability, death, and survivors of eligible members or beneficiaries. Members become fully vested in their retirement benefits earned to date after five years (10 years for State Second Tier members) of credited service.

Contributions: The benefits for the defined benefit pension plans are funded by contributions from members and employers, and earnings from investments. Member and employer contributions are a percentage of applicable member compensation. Member contribution rates are defined by law and depend on the respective employer’s benefit formulas. Employer contribution rates are determined by periodic actuarial valuations or by state statute. Actuarial valuations are based on the benefit formulas and employee groups of each employer. Employer contributions, including lump sum contributions made when agencies first join the PERF, are credited with a market value adjustment in determining contribution rates.

The required contribution rates of most active plan members are based on a percentage of salary in excess of a base compensation amount ranging from zero dollars to \$863 monthly.

Required contribution rates for active plan members and employers as a percentage of payroll for the year ended June 30, 2016 were as follows:

Members - The member contribution rate was 6.0 or 7.0 percent of applicable member earnings for fiscal year 2015-16.

Employers - The employer contribution rate was 11.847 percent of applicable member earnings.

The District contributed \$2,968,813 to the plan for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2016.

Pension Liabilities, Pension Expense, and Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to Pensions

At June 30, 2016, the District reported a liability of \$31,837,000 for its proportionate share of the net pension liability. The net pension liability was measured as of June 30, 2015, and the total pension liability used to calculate the net pension liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of June 30, 2014. The District’s proportion of the net pension liability was based on the District’s share of contributions to the pension plan relative to the contributions of all participating school Districts. At June 30, 2015, the District’s proportion was 0.216 percent, which was an increase of 0.001 percent from its proportion measured as of June 30, 2014.

For the year ended June 30, 2016, the District recognized pension expense of \$2,636,903. At June 30, 2016, the District reported deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions from the following sources:

Differences between expected and actual experience and changes in assumptions are amortized over a closed period equal to the average remaining service life of plan members, which is 4 years as of the June 30, 2015 measurement date. Deferred outflows and inflows related to differences between projected and actual earnings on plan investments are netted and amortized over a closed 5-year period.

Actuarial Methods and Assumptions: The total pension liability for the Plan was determined by applying update procedures to a financial reporting actuarial valuation as of June 30, 2014, and rolling forward the total pension liability to June 30, 2015. The financial reporting actuarial valuation as of June 30, 2014, used the following actuarial methods and assumptions, applied to all prior periods included in the measurement:

Discount Rate: The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 7.65 percent. A projection of the expected benefit payments and contributions was performed to determine if assets would run out. The test revealed the assets would not run out. Therefore the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability for the Plan. The results of the crossover testing for the Plan are presented in a detailed report that can be obtained at CalPERS’ website.

The discount rate was 7.50 and 7.65 percent in the June 30, 2013 and June 30, 2014 actuarial reports, respectively.

The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was determined using a building-block method in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class.

In determining the long-term expected rate of return, CalPERS took into account both short-term and long-term market return expectations as well as the expected cash flows of the Plan. Such cash flows were developed assuming that both members and employers will make their required contributions on time and as scheduled in all future years. Using historical returns of all the Plan’s asset classes, expected compound (geometric) returns were calculated over the short-term (first 10 years) and the long-term (11-60 years) using a building-block approach. Using the expected nominal returns for both short-term and long-term, the present value of benefits was calculated. The expected rate of return was set by calculating the single equivalent expected return that arrived at the same present value of benefits for cash flows as the one calculated using both short-term and long-term returns. The expected rate of return was then set equivalent to the single equivalent rate calculated above and rounded down to the nearest one quarter of one percent.

NOTE 9 - OTHER POSTEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

Plan Description: The Postemployment Benefit Plan (the "Plan") is a single-employer defined benefit healthcare plan administered by the Berkeley Unified School District. The Plan provides medical and dental insurance benefits to eligible retirees and their spouses. The plan does not issue separate financial statements.

Funding Policy: The contribution requirements of plan members of the District are established and may be amended by the District and the California Teachers Association (CTA), the local California Service Employees Association (CSEA), and unrepresented groups. The required contribution is based on projected pay-as-you-go financing requirements, with an additional amount to prefund benefits as determined annually through the agreements between the District, CTA, CSEA and the unrepresented groups. For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2016, the District contributed \$838,953 to the plan.

The District’s annual other postemployment benefit (OPEB) cost (expense) is calculated based on the annual required contribution of the employer (ARC), an amount actuarially determined in accordance with the parameters of GASB Cod. Sec. P50.108-109. The ARC represents a level of funding that, if paid on an ongoing basis, is projected to cover normal cost each year and amortize any unfunded actuarial liabilities (or funding excess) over a period not to exceed thirty years. As of June 1, 2015, the most recent actuarial valuation date, the plan was unfunded. The actuarial accrued liability for benefits was \$16.9 million. The covered payroll (annual payroll of active employees covered by the Plan) was \$80.3 million, and the ratio of the UAAL to the covered payroll was 21.1 percent. The OPEB plan is currently operated as a pay-as-you-go plan.

Actuarial valuations of an ongoing plan involve estimates of the value of reported amounts and assumptions about the probability of occurrence of events far into the future. Examples include assumptions about future employment, mortality, and the healthcare cost trend. Amounts determined regarding the funded status of the plan and the annual required contributions of the employer are subject to continual revision as actual results are compared with past expectations and new estimates are made about the future. The schedule of funding progress, shown as Required Supplementary Information, presents multiyear trend information about whether the actuarial value of plan assets is increasing or decreasing over time relative to the actuarial accrued liabilities for benefits.

Projections of benefits for financial reporting purposes are based on the substantive plan (the plan as understood by the employer and the plan members) and include the types of benefits provided at the time of each valuation and the historical pattern of sharing of benefit costs between the employer and plan members to that point. The actuarial methods and assumptions used include techniques that are designed to reduce the effects of short-term volatility in actuarial accrued liabilities and the actuarial value of assets, consistent with the long-term perspective of the calculations.

In the June 1, 2015 actuarial valuation, the entry age actuarial cost method was used. The actuarial assumptions included a 4.5 percent investment rate (net of administrative expenses), which is a blended rate of the expected long-term investment returns on plan assets and on the employer's own investments calculated based on the funded level of the plan on the valuation date, an annual healthcare cost trend rate of 4.0 percent, and a payroll increase of 2.75 percent, annually. The UAAL is being amortized as a level percentage of projected payroll on an open basis. The remaining amortization period at June 30, 2016, was 25 years.

NOTE 10 - RISK MANAGEMENT

Workers' Compensation: The District's workers' compensation program activities are recorded in the District's Self-Insurance Fund. The program accounts for the risk financing activities of the District, but does not constitute a transfer of risk from the District.

Property and Liability: The District is exposed to various risks of loss related to its assets, errors and omissions, injuries to employees, and natural disasters. The District has contracted with Alliance of Schools for Cooperative Insurance Program (ACSIP) for excess property and liability insurance over the self-insured retention of \$25,000 per occurrence, up to \$250,000. The District has also contracted with Schools Excess Liability Fund (SELF) for excess property and liability insurance coverage of claims over \$250,000. The property and liability program activities are recorded in the District's Internal Service Fund. The liability program accounts for the risk financing activities of the District, but does not constitute a transfer of risk from the District

Settled claims resulting from the programs above have not exceeded commercial insurance coverage in any of the past three fiscal years. There have been no significant reductions in insurance coverage from coverage in the prior year..

NOTE 11 - JOINT POWERS AUTHORITIES

The District is a member with other school districts in two Joint Powers Authorities, Schools Excess Liability Fund (SELF) and Alliance of Schools for Cooperative Insurance Program (ASCIP), for the operation of a common risk management and insurance program for property and liability coverage. SELF and ASCIP are governed by Governing Boards consisting of representatives from each member district. The Boards control the operations of SELF and ASCIP, including selections of management and approval of operating budgets. Settled claims resulting from these risks have not exceeded commercial insurance coverage in any of the past three fiscal years. There have been no significant reductions in insurance coverage from coverage in the prior year.

The General Fund fund balance has increased by \$10,234,624 over the past three fiscal years. The District projects a decrease of \$6,704,309 for the year ending June 30, 2017. For a district this size, the State of California recommends available reserves of at least 3% of total General Fund expenditures, transfers out, and other uses be maintained. For the year ended June 30, 2016, the District has met this requirement. For the purposes of calculating the District's available reserves, the ending fund balance of the Special Reserve for Other Than Capital Projects Fund is included as designated for economic uncertainties.

The District has incurred operating surpluses in each of the past three years, but anticipates incurring an operating deficit during 2016-17 fiscal year.

Total long-term liabilities have increased by \$147,236,232 over the past two years, principally because of the issuance of general obligation bonds and the implementation of GASB Statement Nos. 68 and 71.

Average daily attendance has increased by 187 over the past two years. The District does not anticipate a change in ADA during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2017.
