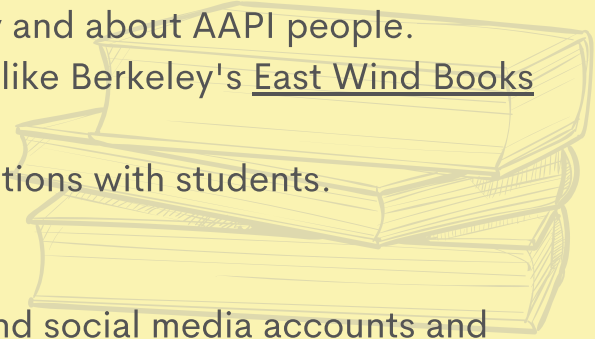
Expand Your Book Collection to Include AAPI Voices...
